Dear friends,

The following is a slightly amended version of an announcement that I made to the congregation on Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> March.

After almost 19 years as your minister, it's time for me to mention the "R" word.

For many years my normal retirement age was 65 and, believe it or not, I reach that milestone on 25<sup>th</sup> August this summer.

However, a few years ago, my normal retirement age moved up to 66 – that would happen on 25<sup>th</sup> August 2026.

I fully intended to continue as minister of GPC up to my 66<sup>th</sup> birthday – until a few months ago when, after much prayerful reflection, I came to the clear view that, as far as I could discern, this was not the Lord's will for me or for GPC.

So I have recently shared my intentions with our paid employees (Laura, Alf, Anne and Roy) and with the Kirk Session. Following East Belfast Presbytery's approval at its meeting on 4<sup>th</sup> March, I now wish to bring you as members of the GPC church family up to speed. All of this remains subject to the General Assembly granting its approval in June, but that is a very likely outcome.

So the plan is that I would retire on 15th September this year, a few weeks after my 65<sup>th</sup> birthday.

Why? Because things are going relatively well within our congregation with encouraging signs of growth in our spiritual life and so actually it's good for me to aim to finish well and avoid the temptation to stay on for another year.

That would run the risk of me running out of a bit of steamnever mind the risk of unforeseen ill health disrupting my ability to work. While I have enjoyed very good health up until now, I'm mindful that my mum died at the age of 66.

I think it is also a good time for GPC. Instead of a year maybe treading water awaiting my retirement, there is now a clarity and relative certainty about the near future. It's the right time for GPC to crack on into a new chapter of its history (His Story). By retiring 6 months from now on 15<sup>th</sup> September, I will be able to assist with the preparations for the start of the 2025/26 church year, while not unduly delaying progress towards the calling of a new minister.

So briefly what will happen? Over the next 6 months, we must not become distracted by my retirement – the focus needs to remain fully on Jesus and our worship, service and witness to him.

In due course, Presbytery will appoint a Vacancy Commission consisting of ministers and elders from other congregations in East Belfast - including one minister who will be the Vacancy Convener. They will effectively serve in a part-time capacity as the minister of GPC.

It may be helpful to mention at this stage that Roy Mackay has kindly agreed to continue in his current role as pastoral & preaching support - if the Vacancy Convener so wishes.

I should make it clear that, whereas I am normally significantly involved in the work of Vacancy Commissions as Clerk of Presbytery, I will not be in regard to Gilnahirk; and, once I have retired, I will draw a very clear line in terms of engagement in or comment upon GPC in the future for the sake of my successor.

I would be quietly confident that GPC is in a good place to be granted leave to call a new minister; and I will be praying that the person of God's choosing will take GPC forward with much blessing and fruitfulness – hopefully if all runs smoothly by the summer of 2026 or thereabouts – but of course nothing is guaranteed! Nevertheless, we can rest in the assurance that God's will and His timing are perfect.

It is really important that the leaders and members of the congregation foster harmony and unity through the coming months. This is not a time for pursuing personal agendas. The recently revised Mission Plan drawn up by Mariann Gilicze and Heather Taylor and adopted by the Kirk Session is an extremely creative and constructive foundation for the Vacancy and a really useful resource for attracting applications from eligible ministers.

More information about the Vacancy process will be shared as and when appropriate, but I think this is sufficient for now.

So the headline news is that, subject to the approval of the General Assembly in June, I will be retiring as minister of GPC on 15<sup>th</sup> September 2025.

All of this needs to be covered with prayer. So please pray for me to be enabled by God to finish well that which He has called me here to do for 19 years; for the new minister – that Jesus would be preparing them for this role even now; and for GPC - that as a congregation you would be guided by the Holy Spirit throughout the whole process.


# **MESSY CHURCH**

# **SCHOOLS MINISTRY WORK**

# Gilnahirk Primary School (GPS)

Scripture Union continues to meet in GPS on Tuesday afternoons 3-4pm for pupils in P4-P7. Laura forms part of the leadership team alongside school staff and other local church leaders. This term the theme has been 'Friendship' and we have had great fun learning more about examples of friendships in the Bible (such as Ruth & Naomi; Moses & Aaron; Shadrach, Meshach & Abednego; and David & Jonathan), all the while pointing to Jesus who is the best friend we could ever have or need!

Laura also had the opportunity this term to deliver RE Lessons to the P5 classes as part of a team including Jax McCallum (SU East Belfast Schools Worker) and Drew Steele (Pastor at Gilnahirk Baptist Church). These lessons focused on three miracles of Jesus and what Christians believe these miracles tell us about God. Next term Laura will participate in P7 Lessons entitled 'It's Your Move' which help to prepare pupils for the major transition from primary school to secondary school. Once again these are really valuable opportunities to support our local school and be present as God's people in the community.

### **UNITE SU**

Laura has recently been able to support local 'Unite SU' events which involve bringing secondary school SUs together after school to enjoy games, worship and word. This term CFC hosted a Junior Event and Kirkpatrick Memorial kindly hosted a Senior Event. A local 'Unite Committee', mainly made up of senior pupils from across various East Belfast schools, plans and leads each event, supported by SU staff. Having a pupil-led approach is really important and a great way to encourage and develop young leaders. Unite SU events are also a really important way to connect young people together, and can be a particularly meaningful opportunity for pupils who find that they are the only Christian in their class. The next Unite Event is on Friday 9th May and we would encourage any young person to look out for more info through their school.

# Our Lady and St Patrick's College Knock (OLSPCK)

In January we enjoyed partnering with the local Gilnahirk and Braniel Churches to visit OLSPCK for a series of Assemblies and class visits, as part of the Week of Prayer For Christian Unity. Unfortunately Storm Eowyn meant we had to cancel the final day due to the school closures, but for most of the week we were able to share creatively about how 'the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it', based on John 1. Somehow Stephen's candle just kept relighting even after he had blown it out!

Below is the prayer we shared together in Assembly each morning:

Jesus, Light of the world, May your light shine in places of darkness, bringing a new dawn of hope and possibility. May mercy, justice and salvation flow in every area of society. Jesus, Prince of peace, May your peace reach into places of violence, war and unrest. bringing reconciliation and forgiveness. Jesus, wonderful Counsellor, May your wisdom be given to all those who make decisions that impact us all. Raise up peacemakers. courageous and compassionate leaders, who hear your voice. Jesus, Immanuel, God with us, May your near presence with us mean that the lonely, broken and rejected of our world find new value, acceptance and love. Lord Jesus, may we demonstrate your presence by living joyous, hope-filled, loving lives throughout this coming year. Jesus, light of the world, shine Your light into our darkness and help us to reflect the light of your love to those around us. Amen.

During March we have enjoyed return visits from the school as Year 9 OLSPCK pupils have come to visit our GPC as part of the RE curriculum, as well as St Dorothea's and Gilnahirk Baptist. Pupils learn more about the significance of various features within the church sanctuary, as well as some of the distinctions between the different denominations. These visits are a valuable way of connecting with a local school and supporting them in practical ways, while demonstrating our Christian unity.

# THE BIG SPLASH

Every few months our Kirk Session Children, Youth & Family Team organises an event for young families as an opportunity to connect, build relationships, and make fun memories! For the second year running we went to Lisburn Leisureplex for 'The Big Splash'. Children, teens, parents, aunties, uncles, grandparents and leaders enjoyed a fun-filled pool session (including some serious slides!), followed by yummy food and great chat in a party room. A huge thankyou to those who both organised and attended.

# **ROOTS**

Our young people in Roots are exploring more about the persecuted church through the charity Open Doors. In countries across the world, Christians can be targeted with violence, driven from their homes, rejected by family, imprisoned, excluded from jobs and opportunities, and even killed. But, as we are learning, that isn't stopping many Christians from continuing to follow God and share His love. We have been able to consider what it must be like to have to meet secretly for church, rather than meeting so freely as we get to do in Gilnahirk. We hope to share more about what we have been learning with the wider congregation. We would love for you to come and experience our 'Way of the Cross' display which will be available to visit in the Stye Brae before the evening services on Sunday 6th April, Sunday 13th April (Palm Sunday) and Friday 18th April (Good Friday).

As you go through the activities we'll be reading Psalm 100, all about praising God for the life he has given us.

# Listen out for birdsong

"Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs." v1-2

It's so good to sing, shout or whisper to tell God what we're thankful for and to be excited about his beautiful world.

- What do you think the birds are saying?
- Can you learn to identify a bird by its song?



"Know that the Lord is God. It is he who made us, and we are his." v3

God is incredible. He made us in his image and we are all unique - just like the clouds!

- What makes you feel safe?




# 5. Spot something beautiful

Finally, Jesus said, 'It is finished' and he died.




Three days later, Jesus friends went to visit his tomb.


When they arrived, it was empty. The huge stone has been moved.


# **Masking Tape Cross**

# Thinking Day / Founders' Day Service Sunday 23rd February

On Sunday 23rd February, Gilnahirk Presbyterian Church was bursting at the seams as the uniformed organisations joined forces to celebrate Thinking Day and Founders' Day. This annual event commemorates the joint birthday of Lord Baden Powell, the founder of the Scout movement, and his wife, Lady Baden Powell, who was the first World Chief Guide, and is a very special occasion for all the organisations.

The Guides looked to the past, recounting the story of the birth of Guiding and Scouting.

The Scouts shared a video of their visit to Srebrenica during their summer Camp in Bosnia. This year is the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the massacre there which saw more than 8000 Muslim men and boys killed during the Bosnian War. This provided an opportunity for the Scouts to learn about what had happened and consider the implications of the events and the lessons that could be learnt for the future.

The Beavers reminded us of the importance of enjoying the present, with a joyful rendition of 'Your Love for Me', complete with energetic choreography.

The heart of the service is the renewal of the Promises, made at enrolment, by each of the organisations in turn. Laura reminded us that, while it is easy to say the words, it is harder to keep them every day but we must 'let our yes mean yes and our no mean no' - in other words say what we mean and mean what we say!

Congratulations to all the young people who looked so smart and behaved so well and thank you to all the parents and friends for coming to support us. Same time next year?



# The High Cross Roy Mackay

A feature seen on early Irish landscapes is the High Cross which dates back to the 9<sup>th</sup> century AD. Stone Celtic crosses, as they are frequently called, are dotted over many areas of the island. The oldest one is reckoned to be at Carndonagh, Co Donegal at the top of the Inishowen Peninsula. It is around three metres in height and made of sandstone. The High Cross usually displays early medieval carvings of biblical scenes used to teach a message from the scriptures.



As Christianity in Ireland grew from the time of Patrick and over the early centuries, so the High Cross stood as a symbol that Christianity had arrived but also as a boundary mark, particularly for monastic communities of the period.

When we turn, at this Easter season, to the crucifixion of Jesus recorded in the Gospel accounts, a cross was not so welcoming. Instead, it suggested an execution in all its painful horror. A former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, summarizes it in these words:

"We have become so familiar with this image - that we sanitize it. We go to places of worship and we expect to see a cross.

When crosses are removed from public places such as crematoria or hospital chapels, we quite reasonably get indignant about it. But in the world into which Christ came a place of worship was the last place you expect to see a cross."

The Gospel writers emphasize Jesus' death in all its horror and pain. For them, the cross was not something to embrace lightly. Luke in his account of the last moments of Jesus' crucifixion (Luke 23:44-49) tells that at the approach of Jesus' death, darkness covered the whole land for three hours. This was a significant and sombre moment.

Other New Testament accounts remind us of the great mental agony and burden that had been placed on Jesus in his crucifixion. It is recorded that he cried out,

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Mark 15:34)

We may well ask what is the meaning behind Jesus' particular death on a cross with so much symbolism surrounding it? Sometimes we say that Jesus died on the cross to show us God's love. Yet, while true, the Gospel writers want to say something more - for the crucifixion of Jesus had profound consequences for the world and for people of every generation.

Some years later, after Jesus' death and resurrection, the Apostle Paul wrote about the ultimate implications of the cross for all who believe in Jesus:

"Christ who knew no sin became sin for us that we might become the righteousness of God." (2 Corinthians 5:21)

In those words, we come to the central meaning of the cross of Christ. For Jesus took our place in His death - going down to the very depths for us that we might not be forsaken by God.

So, this Easter time, when we are surrounded by many symbols of the holiday season, let us re-focus on the cross. While it presents pain and horror, yet it is in this death of Christ that we can find eternal life. Again, in the words of Paul:

"May we never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ..." (Galatians 6:14)

# **Malcolm Strain**

Malcolm Strain was born in East Belfast and baptised in Gilnahirk Presbyterian Church. He was an engineer, a pipe band member, a mountaineer, a training instructor at RAF Sydenham, a member of the armed forces, a civil servant, a marathon runner, a motorcyclist, a cyclist, an artist and "a Blue Man"!

Above all, he was a child of God and a committed follower of Jesus Christ. A long serving elder in Gilnahirk Presbyterian Church, he diligently exercised a spiritual ministry to members of the congregation in his district.

His strong faith was evident in every aspect of his life including during his last months as he faced illness and his approaching death. He prayerfully trusted the Lord for the last stage of his journey in this life and for eternity.
